


➤ Begin by thinking about your **Career Goal**. Identify a career of interest in the space below. Be specific.



## RESOURCES FOR POST-SECONDARY PLANNING

As you plan for the education needed for specific careers, keep the following things in mind:

- You probably have some idea of a career for your future, but many colleges and universities have programs you might not even realize exist. If you research them now, you increase your chances of finding a career idea that is a great fit for you. Then you can make sure you take the proper high school courses to prepare you.
- Different colleges and universities often have different entry requirements even if the program name is the same. Check each school carefully to make sure you will be eligible for the programs you want to apply to in your graduating year.
- Students interested in apprenticeships should plan for Coop in a senior year of high school to get practical work experience. Weldon also has OYAP - the Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program, a 4-credit Co Op linked to college training in grade 12.
